

B.J.H. ~ THE ROAD CREW

Continuing our series of articles on the boys' road crew, this time we feature IAN "BUCKO" BUXTON the lighting and special effects engineer. Over to Bucko ...

"I was still at college when I fist saw BJH performing, possibly in 1972. I was impressed then, but even more so the next time I saw the when they were headlining a festival at Wheeley. On that occasion they had an orchestra backing them, the sound was fabulous.

Well, I went on to finish my education in textile design, not feeling cust out to be a studio designer and so I took various odd jobs until a friend invited me to do a short tour with a now defunct band called Caravan. I wasn't to be paid but the experience might help me to find more work in the music business. And so it did, my next tour was with Uriah Heep.

Following that, in 1976, I did my first tour with BJH and, being star struck (remember, I had last seen them playing before 35,000 people) I did the whole tour without actually talking to any of the band!

From then on I became more active in the business, touring with Status Quo, Joan Armatrading and others, but each year working with BJH on their annual tour.

It was in my third year with BJH that I became involved in designing their stage set which indluded a New York skyline and the original Saddleworth hills. The following year I was responsible for a hugh fan structure (a rather dubious honour) and for the first time took over the desk operation. It was during this time that the first impression was being made in Europe. I can still recall the Beer Kellars and halls up ten flights of stairs!

Since those times BJH have come a long way and I am happily still involved. Here's hoping I shall still be involved in another ten years time.

IAN (BUCKO) BUXTON "

QUESTION TIME WITH IAN

1. How do you transport lights and gear from venue to venue without damaging them?

Generally the equipment used is made specifically for touring and is built to withdtand the rigours. The trucks we use are fitted with air ride suspension which help to give it a smoother ride. However, problems do sometimes occur, in which case we rely on the competence of the crew/technicians to sort things out.

2. What sort of lights do you use ie spots or a combination of spots and others?

The standard item, typical of most touring shows, is a lamp known as a Par 64. On our last tour we had about 200 of these plus 100 effects lights. In addition, we used 4 spots, in the house they were Supertroopers and from stage Pani's.

3. How do you get power for the lights at each performance? Do you have to rely on the venue or do you have your own generators ?

Prior to any tour a list of our requirements is sent to all local promotors. Detailing our needs in electricity, dressing rooms, stage size etc. We typically use about 600 amps of which most venues have an adequate supply. However, on occasions we use generators and in fact when touring France we take one with us everywhere, because of the erratic nature of the supply there.

4. Can you give details of the winged woman neon emblem ie how did you produce the effect of the wings opening and shutting?

Basimally we use three wing positions, which is the minimum number to produce the effect of movement. First an outer image of the wing is lit. The a mid position and finally an inner position. Then back to the mid position then the outer and so on. The viewers brain does the rest. The brain translates what it sees into a flowing movement, because it decides that it what it is doing.

5. How many assistants do you have and how long does it take to assemble everything?

On the last two tours there has been a lighting crew of six men plus myself. The first man usually enters the hall at 9am and the bulk of the lighting needs to be in the air, off the stage that is, by 11.30am. It's then that they start to bring in the pa and stage gear. The rest of the day is spent attending to additional lighting on or about the stage and the special effects and focusing. We try to be finished in time for the sound check so that we can run a visital check and have a meal in time for the show. From the end of the show til we close the back doors of the truck takes about 3 hurs.

6. What sort of lighting experience did you have prior to joining BJH ?

Not a lot. When I first worked with BJH which was 9 years ago, I was operating a spotlight as an apprenctice. It was about three years later, having worked with a variety of bands including BJH that I had my opportunity of designing and operating a show for BJH.

- 7. How much say do BJH have in the selection of effects and how have their own ideas developed through the years? Having grown up with the band I credit all my ideas to BJH. Typically, when a new album is meleased, I listen to it constantly, making sketches of the pictures it creates in my mind. Then I confront the band and we sit down and discuss the possibilities trying to find the ideal which reflects their feelings and has visual potential. I believe the stage/lighting show has always been an extension of the music having developed through the years together.
- 8. Is there any idea which has been too ambitious to reproduce on stage on a BJH tour?

We have never chosen a design and not been able to achieve the desired effect. I think ideas have occurred which perhaps were technically impracticale, but for aesthetic reasons were shelved anyway. The practical limitations are never far from our minds such as stage size, trucking facilities etc. Possibly to some extent this controls our ideas. Without these limitations I would hate to imagine what we might get up to!

- 9. Who actually designs the light show?
- I do, with help and advice from the band, the management and everybody else involved with us. It's a little like a family situation in that everybody contributes something and everybody has a pride in what they are involved with i.e. B.J.H.
- 10. Is ther a set sequence of lights for each number performed? Do the sequences change during the course of a tour?

I usually allow about ten shows before settling down to a regular pattern. Allowing for rehearsals it usually means that we are pretty well organised from the start of a tour. However, the show continues to dvelop throughout the tour with variations on most nights. There is this peculair situation of putting the lights up, seemingly identically, in different situations and getting different effects. The next tour we do, we may be using a computer control board, in theory that should enable us to create exactly the same show from night to night.

Well, thanks very much Ian for taking up so much of your valuable time answering the questions.

Due to forthcoming tour committments and the fact that the entire BJH road show are heavily engaged in rehearsals, our articles will hve to take a back seat for the next couple of issues. However, under pressure from you lot I am the next subject of question time so any questions you would like to ask me (not too personal - I'm shy) please let me have by mid-May and I'll do what I can.
